MATRIC RESULTS CEREMONY

We held our annual Matric Results Celebration on Tuesday, 23 January 2024. During the ceremony the 51 Matrics of 2023 were elated to see each other, now Matric graduates and King's alumni, with much laughter, hugs and congratulations shared. Parents watched as each learner received their IEB Matric results and special achievements were celebrated. In particular, King's celebrated their 100% pass rate since 2009, 70 distinctions as well as their top IEB achievers.

Special mentions included Sean Andrews, achieving 8 A's, a 90% aggregate, scoring in the Top1% of all IEB candidates in Accounting, English HL, Mathematics, Physical Sciences, Further Studies Mathematics and Life Orientation. Sean Andrews also made the IEB Outstanding Achievements list. King's is extremely proud to be one of the 25 schools countrywide represented on this list.

Hannah Soekoe scored in the Top 1% for English HL and Life Orientation, while Kingsley Okonkwo scored in the Top 1% for Business Studies. King's is also proud of their outstanding Grade 12 teachers who work tirelessly to ensure King's reaches 100% pass rate year on year and its ultimate goal of raising Godly leaders.

Describing herself in 5 words, she says she is passionate, faithful, driven, caring, and strong-minded. It is no surprise that Miss Reynecke is one of the favourite teachers of the term.


The overall winners of the interhouse gala were the Eagles and the Falcons swooped in, claiming the Spirit award.
